Are there counterarguments that I need to address?


Tunnel vision is great, but if you have spent too much time affirming your hypothesis, there might be some theories and frameworks to consider

What evidence supports this point?

No, really. Step back and look for the proof, is this concept true to you simply because you want it to be?

If my thesis is an album, who do I need to work with on each song to produce a competitive body of work?

Peers, tutors, mentors, advisors, you choose. Alone, you will be stuck longer than necessary.



What's the core idea or argument of this section?

Are you saying what you think you are saying? Are your technical or theoretical anchors well established?

Who or what is affected by this niche and to what extent?

Sometimes you have undervalued one stakeholder group and overrepresented another. Have you identified, measured, and analyzed cause and effect?

What am I taking for granted and what is it costing me?

The privileges you rely on might be backing you into the corner or leaving you overexposed in a field. Paragraph by paragraph, consider what you are taking for granted and where it is forcing you go as a researcher.

Which voices hold authority in this field and can I comfortably represent their stance?

At the very least make sure that you know and easily narrate what the A-listers are known for.

How bad can my writing get?

lol, didn't see that one coming huh?

Snoop around for articles with poorly fleshed-out ideas, holes in argumentation, and theoretical liberties - then grade your own writing through the same lens.

What question remains unanswered in this field and what components make it illusive?

Tip: Conference speakers and their corresponding Q&A sessions where folks get grilled is a great place to refresh the questions you are pursuing

What core principles are guiding my hypothesis?

Best Practice: Keep it to one page and see if you can teach one class three different ways based on that one page.

So what?

Sometimes you spend a lot of time pointing out the obvious, revealing the unknown, and highlighting important concepts, but if the cause you are pursuing isn't clear, your thesis might read like a random collection of cool facts and theories.

Find the golden thread and give us a reason to care about this particular collection of data points being assembled in this way.

Am I clueless or am I just bored?


What was the research development plan?

How far are you on the list? What questions have been answered?

Find an intellectual exercise or community to tap into for more questions and answers. The motion will stimulate your intellectual curiosity and get you to the next milestone.

What could I possibly be wrong about and have I left room to explore ideas towards what might be less wrong?


Test to see if you have coffee or Kool-Aid in that mug on your desk.



Always hit them with a ta-da! Even if it is to prove to them that you also know what they know.

If each paragraph were a lecture that I had to give, what fundamentals would I cover?

This is the easiest way to answer the silent question of "What am I even talking about". Use every inch of real estate (aka word count) wisely.




If all the papers are starting to sound the same, have I captured the essence of each relevant writer?

There has to be at least one thing that makes each person's perspective stand out. Find it, explore it, and decide what it means for the questions you are investigating.

What makes a writer relevant, and how can I represent these criteria on paper?

Tip: Ask the 'elders' in your department to give you their top 3 great minds in the field and reasons why.




You might have great furniture pieces, but if your layout is incongruent, your living room will be uncomfortable to look at and chill in.

Make the reader's life easy, even if you have to get a tutor.

What are people in my field tired of hearing and why is that perspective so tiring?

Tease out the cliches and acknowledge the obvious, show that you have explored the lay of the land, and have a clear sight of all the things that matter.



How far away from my proposal have I drifted and why?

Sometimes you have to stop writing and launch a search party. Where did you switch things up and go off the trail in pursuit of easy and shiny objects?

If my thesis were a 10-year old character, what would their personality be like?

Whether you like it or not, the evaluators will give your research a character and develop one about you as the writer as well. Beat them to it!

What questions do I get when I review a peer's work?

Write down every impression you get, questions you ask, analysis you admire, etc. Then turn around and apply the exact same to your writing.

What's the weakest part of this draft, and how might you improve it?

You know when you were striving to hit a word count or check a theoretical point.

Highlight your weaknesses in a specific colour and return to them one at a time.



What are three perfectly viable ways to prove my point and have I explored them all?

You might be spending too much time in the research wilderness. Know when you have proven a point and move on

What is the history of this niche and how did it come about?

This pie got these slices for a reason, poke around and find out. The WHY will sharpen your pattern recognition.

What kind of feedback would be most helpful for you right now?

Be honest about how far you are, why you have chosen a specific path, and where your struggles are - and then ask for help where help can be found.

If you had one more day to revise, what would you focus on?

Pick one thing and apply the 1% improvement rule.



Can I give a specific example to illustrate this point?

One instance that is well-explained will save you many sentences of explanation.

What changed between my last draft and this one?

If you can't explain the change, you won't be able to apply the learnings in other sections and chapters.

Am I setting up any questions in one paragraph that you answer in the next?

Join the carts before the train leaves the station, friend.

How good can my writing get?

Remember when you wrote that one thing that convinced you that academic writing wasn't bad?

Go find it, print it out, and review all the things that worked about your analysis and your writing.

How many more semesters do you have in you?

Getting to a resolution might matter more for your reputation at this point. Get it done and move on.

What am I avoiding?

Be honest about the techniques that scare you, the theories that are a little complex, and the bodies of work that bore you. Run towards them aggressively and get them out of the way.

What is the state on my academic relationships?

Sometimes your writing (or lack thereof) is impacted by the nature of your relationships. Close the laptop and figure out a plan to make things right.

How many people will care?

The real answer is that very few people will care about the thesis itself. Your evaluators matter the most right now and your research skills will matter in your next professional season.

So display the skill of academic rigor and keep it moving.

Before You Put The Book Down..

If you've spent time with this book, then you've already done something brave—you've chosen to keep asking questions, even when the answers feel far away. That's the heart of writing, really: trying, stumbling, rethinking, and trying again.

Progress often comes quietly. In the messy drafts. In the reworked sentences. In the moments you sit down even when you're not sure what to say.

Let this book be a reminder that clarity comes through movement, not perfection. Keep it close. Return to it when you're stuck, or just need a nudge to keep moving forward.
